

MCSD SNOW DAY PROTOCOL

If schools are closed due to bad weather, **REMOTE LEARNING** will replace in-person learning for that day. Remote Learning will begin two hours later than a normal in-person schedule.

Additionally, the following program adjustments will be made:

All Field Trips Cancelled

All School Lunch and Breakfast Cancelled

Pre-school, AM and PM Kindergarten Cancelled

All-day kindergarten will move to remote learning and start two hours later

Extra-curricular activities and outside building rentals will be TBD (watch for school announcements)

PREPAREDENESS: Every effort will be made to notify schools before the workday ends, the day before, if there is a possibility of school closure (100% remote learning) the next day so teachers and students may prepare.

MCSD FULL-DAY CLOSURE PROCEDURE: This would only occur when there is extreme environmental concerns or safety issues. For example, an extreme wind day when our students have no power available to facilitate online/remote learning from home and our teachers would not be able to facilitate lesson plans.

PROTOCOL: Rod Pace will call David Roberts before 5:00 a.m. with a status of snow conditions as he and his crews are out plowing.

David Roberts will call Murray City Streets Department and the National Weather Service by 5:00 a.m. to get a status as to what the street conditions are at that time and what conditions are projected to be by 7:00 a.m.

By 5:15 a.m., David Roberts will call Superintendent Jennifer Covington with an update of road and weather conditions. Superintendent Covington will consult with the Board President or Vice President and before 6:00 a.m. and a decision will be made whether to hold school or to delay the start of the school day two hours. In the event of a two-hour delay, teachers will begin remote learning two hours later than normal. Students will need to log into their Chromebook at that time to begin learning.

Doug Perry will call Radio and TV stations. Jason Eyre will activate School Messenger/Parent Square. Jason will ensure a message is put on the district phone that reflects the decision for that day.

Principals should be at their schools at the regular school starting time to handle any questions or problems that may arise due to the snowy conditions.
